From the Pulpit

One of the pleasures of winter is being able to go to the cinema without a certain measure of regret that you are spending a precious summer evening inside.

Recently I went to see a gritty and dark film called Tyrannosaur in Panton Street, a favoured venue for catching those films that don't make Epsom Odeon. This film made such an impression that Berwick and I both referred to it when preaching on All Saints' Day, without any previous discussion. Watching was a distinctly uncomfortable experience. The opening frame was of an uncouth thug, Joseph, consumed by rage and kicking his dog to death. His language was full of crude invective.

During the passage of the film, it emerges that Joseph is a widower, jobless, feckless and living in squalor in a derelict and soulless estate. He finds himself drunk and sprawled in front of the metal grid securing a charity shop near his dwelling. The shop is opened by a compassionate, drab and worthy woman, Hannah, who offers to pray for him. His rebuttal is brutal and direct - How could such a woman from the salubrious side of town possibly know about or resonate with his desperate and hopeless life? But he is irresistibly drawn back to the shop and asks Hannah to pray with a friend of his who is terminally ill. Who do we see as the saint here?

During the course of this tense and compelling film it emerges that the woman is being raped and consistently abused by her husband. When Joseph returns to her flat to collect her things, she having sought refuge in his slum, he finds her husband hacked to death. She is convicted of the crime. In the final frame we see them, in the prison visiting room, with hands linked in a poignant and believable picture. Who is the saint here? One of the radical and attractive features of Christianity is that it forces us to take a sideways look at life. God is born in modest circumstance, in human form. His first followers are artisans rather than intellectuals. He associates with all sorts of people, many of whom are the marginalised and untouchable of his day.

The Christian year and its autumn and winter festivals help us come to terms with this ambiguity and enigma. Not only are saints not all predictable and pious, but when we move on to Remembrance Sunday the ambiguity continues. How do we respectfully honour those who die in war without risking glorifying war itself or forgetting that we are called to "love our enemies?" The Sunday designated as Christ the King reminds us that the king we worship is a servant, an itinerant preacher, executed as a criminal.

Advent is a season for acknowledging the wrong we do, a season for waiting, lived out in the context of shops that seduce us to buy more and a credit system that takes the “waiting out of wanting” and confuses needs and desires, turning the later into the former in ever more sophisticated advertisements.

Then we come to the festival of Christmas, a season that epitomises oxymoron; God as man, the most precious gift from God coming to an occupied and insignificant place at an uncertain and unhappy time. The all-seeing, all-knowing God is contained in the frailty of the new born in a temporary dwelling mothered by an unmarried teenager.

To make sense of this we need the Trinity; God as Father, Son and Spirit. Our worship, our community life and our mission needs to be balanced and integrated. If we lose sight of God as Father and creator, we lose our awe, worship and wonder. If we fail to focus on God the Son, we neglect the compassionate face of this unknowable creative force, the humanity of God grounded on earth. If we let the Spirit slide from our vision, we lose energy, purpose, relevance and commitment.

To grasp this elusive, complex God means holding diametrically opposing ideas in creative tension. This is not only difficult but thrilling and profound enough to energise a lifetime search for meaning and message. That is the Christian calling. It needs to be worked out behind privet hedges - in gated estates and concrete tower blocks, in the depths of despair, in the heights of elation, in the mundane and ecstatic experiences that define our humanity.

Healing Ministry at Christ Church

One of our previous Vicars, Derek Bedford, introduced the Ministry of Healing at this church and since that time during the mid 1960's a tradition of praying with people has continued.

This involves a small team of people who have been trained into this ministry and who maintain a strict code of confidentiality to be able to pray with people and ask for God's healing power. We are under the authority of our Vicar and we have bi monthly meetings with Rosemary to review and pray together. If we are feeling vulnerable in any way we seek help or counselling and have a leave of absence until we feel able to serve again. It is a well known fact that God still heals today. We are not the healers, we ask God to come into our lives or situations and the Holy Spirit comes gently into our requests. We are not there to counsel or offer advice – just to pray.

When a person comes up for prayer the person may wish to speak out their concern or pray for the concern of another. Or just come to ask for prayer and not voice their concern. God knows our innermost thoughts and what we need. We usually pray in pairs so that we are aware of the person's needs and one of us can be quietly praying.

We come before God in humility knowing that we are a broken people and sometimes we need healing and peace in our hearts as life has thrown up some trials and sharing the burden with another in the context of personal prayer can bring relief. Nothing is hopeless for God and Jesus told us "ask and you shall receive, seek and you shall find, knock and the door will be opened". God will never barge into our lives and say be healed unless we ourselves give Him the permission to do so. Once we say "yes" to Him then together lives can be changed in many ways. Sometimes we are feeling so sick of it of whatever it is that the only way up is to ask for God's help. People in prison's have made that type of prayer on an Alpha course and been healed of addictions and totally turned their lives around and found that Jesus is there for them and found peace again.

It is truly wonderful that God can help us to serve him in a truthful and loving way. In the presence of God there is freedom to change.

Report from the PCC meetings held on 12 and 14 November

"The way ahead": Continuing the discussion begun with the Vicar at our July meeting, our special Saturday morning meeting was devoted entirely to "unpacking" Christ Church's long standing Vision Statement:

"We are called to be a community open to God's love so that many are:

- *drawn to the light of God's love,*
- *transformed in the fire of Christ's love,*
- *sent out in the power of the Spirit's love."*

Having explored the statement in depth and from various angles, we felt it continues to reflect our vision for Christ Church: while some of the language is perhaps not what we would use today, we saw no need for radical reform.

Within that renewed understanding of our vision, we then turned to setting some clear objectives for Christ Church over the next period – a task completed at our regular meeting on the Monday evening. The targets fall under the four main headings of Vision, Discipleship, Spirituality and Mission, with the principal focus at this stage of helping to build up the church community after the long interregnum.

We aim to have either completed or have clear plans for completing each of the targets by next April's Annual Church Meeting. These targets are, of course, additional to the wide range of Christ Church's continuing activities. They also need to be seen as "work in progress": over time, other things will be built on this base.

Christmas: The Christmas card from Christ Church and the Wells is now printed. All are asked to help in delivering one to every home in the Parish – our major outreach activity of the year.

We endorsed the Vicar's proposal that people within Christ Church should be invited, instead of sending Christmas cards to each other, to sign a giant card in the church and donate the money they would otherwise have spent on the cards to the Christmas Appeal, which is for LeatherHead Start (the new name for Leatherhead Night Shelter).

Missions: At our May meeting, we earmarked £15,000 for Missions and Outreach, the great bulk of which is sent to our 10 "championed" mission causes in two instalments. As usual, the first instalment was paid in the middle of the year. We have now authorised payment of the second instalment.

Next meeting: Our next meeting will be held on Monday 9 January at 8pm in the Hall.

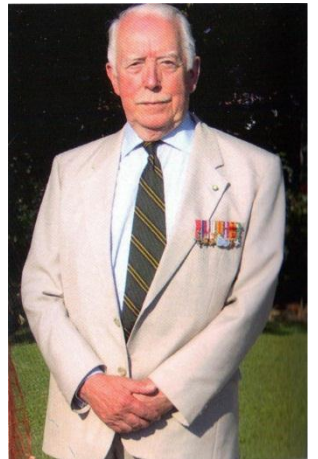
George Hubert Challis C.B.E

26th May 1921 – 20th Oct 2011

George Challis was a man who prayed every night and who was a regular worshipper in Christ Church until “the pews got too hard.” As I thought about George a smiling, courteous face began to emerge. And that smiling, courteous face made him a friend of the City and revealed that he was a friend of God.

George met Margaret at the Bank when 16, and they were married in 1946 embarking upon 65 years of marriage. The church was filled with memories and thanksgivings for Margaret, for Clare, William, and the seven grandchildren to whom George was Grampy and the two grandchildren-in-law. So, an uncle, a great-uncle, a great-great-uncle, a man who enjoyed his 90th birthday party in Oxford, even though he ventured, ‘He would have enjoyed it more had it been at the Randolph’.

1940 to ‘46 George was in the Indian Army, in the 9th Ghurkha Rifles in India, Ceylon, North Africa, Italy, Greece and Austria, seeing much action. He ended the War as a young man, a major, a young man whose memory and experience gave him a foundation on which to build with justice, honesty and integrity through his long involvement with the City of London. Councilman for many years, twice Chief Commoner, Commander of the British Empire, a member of so many companies and committees and clubs, and for all George was a man of absolute integrity. He had one hobby – it was the City.



Whether on the Court of Common Council or as Clerk to the Worshipful Company of Chartered Secretaries, he was in everything what used to be called ‘a Christian gentleman’, a title of greater honour than being twice Chief Commoner or being made a Commander of the British Empire. For a Christian gentleman is not so easy to come by today, to our enormous impoverishment, and we need to make some more. And how are they made? Through praying every day, worshipping regularly, never accepting a gift and always being reliable.

There must have been moments in George Challis’ life, both in the Army and in the City, when he knew real adversity, but like the inheritance to which he was called in Christ Jesus, he didn’t perish, spoil or fade. ‘In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that your faith, of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire, may be proved genuine and may result in praise, glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed’.

We give thanks in George Challis for a man who embodied and lived out Christian values, a man never too proud to neglect his prayers, never tempted by ambition or flattery to cut corners or take the easy way out, a man we can praise and pray for in joyful hope of a glorious resurrection.

CHRIST CHURCH MISSIONS IN 2011

We support ten Missions via our church giving and this year we have made contributions of around £15,000 in total to support them. Here is news of how our donations are used.

African Revival – (Alison North)

This year work has been focussed in Zambia, Uganda and the Sudan on building and improving primary schools. Providing clean water is important not just in terms of hygiene and the effort involved in fetching the water but to allow the children extra time for study. African Aid has used funds from Christ Church to provide several water boreholes and has also worked on its programme of building and improving classrooms. www.africanrevival.org

Bible Society (Diana Tear)

The Bible – ‘the greatest treasure this earth affords.’ These words are used at the Coronation Service when the Monarch is presented with a Bible and the Orb and Sceptre There are several exciting ventures currently going on sponsored by the Bible Society. At the Greenbelt Festival in August, the Society offered some excellent films in a series entitled *Reel Issues*, which aimed to bring films with a particular emphasis on justice and peace to a wider audience. Diana saw ‘Of Gods and Men’ which has been on general release but is usually found in more specialised venues. It was profoundly moving.

October saw our Mission Mart on Bible Sunday when a wide selection of Bibles were on sale including different translations and children’s additions. November brought the offer of free festive stickers for your Christmas cards (examples at back of Church or contact Bible Society on 01793 418330 www.biblesociety.org.uk/christmas11). Look out for a delightful and original video of the Christmas story on the CC website in December. Finally on 15 January, don’t miss the speaker from the Bible Society with all the latest news. Treasures indeed!

The Children's Society – (Marilyn Brown)

Every year more than 100,000 children run away from home or care. By doing so they put themselves at risk. No bed for the night and no-one to trust; at risk of being exploited for sex; exposed to crime, violence, alcohol and drugs. The Children's Society is urging the Government to take action to support every child that runs away and when necessary provide a safe place to stay. A tall order in the present economic climate, but the Society can't help so many children. Please support their Make Runaways Safe campaign at www.makerunawayssafe.org.uk. Marilyn thanks those who have a collection box for their small change and her contacts have raised around £700 during the year.

Church Army, Marylebone Project, London – (Epsom Common Group)

Elgood House, helps to resettle women who have encountered difficulties by offering advice and practical assistance in areas such as accessing training, education and employment to enable residents to move back into the wider community.

This year, changes in government funding have been beneficial as the focus on expenditure is on assisting charities to move people out of a state of poverty via training and counselling etc rather than focussing on providing shelter.

Church Missions Society, Bangladesh - (Elizabeth Martin)

Our contribution continue to support work in Bangladesh where it is estimated that 20,000 young women and girls are tricked into travelling abroad and are then trafficked by unscrupulous middlemen who may brutally torture them. Those who escape and return home are stigmatised in their communities. James has helped to develop a project to raise awareness in the community to train staff to assist these returning women and to provide training for returned migrants to give them a 'fresh start' in life. Dipty Linda is working with local colleagues to provide education to children in their own language. Christ Church congratulates James and Dipty Linda on the birth of their daughter, Sophia. James is a local lad and we are proud to support their work in Bangladesh. Go to www.cms-uk.org to add to that support yourself.

MU Christ Church Freetown Sierra Leone - (MU:Devorah Burns)

The Christ Church Branch of MU in Freetown Sierra Leone celebrated their 60th Anniversary in March this year. An offer of a gift from members of MU Christ Church Epsom resulted in a request for a copy of the King James Bible - very appropriate in the year of the "400th Anniversary" of that translation. Thanks to Sue Curtis who arranged for the inscription which set out the date and the special event for which the gift was intended. As well as sending the bible and a few small personal gifts we were also able to provide £400, £250 of which was provided by the Missions Committee, towards their schooling fund which helps support children who otherwise would not be able to go to school.

Orphan Aid, Durban, South Africa - (Greg Edwards)

Orphan AID has been extremely grateful for the continued contributions made from Christ Church over the past year. The donated funds have been used in two different ways:

- Improving the housing infrastructure for aged grandparents who have 'adopted' their grandchildren, whose parents have passed away.
- Major vehicle repairs to the 2nd hand 4X4 which has suffered much wear 'n tear due to the rugged terrain it has to travel daily to distribute food / clothes to those in need.

Umthombo Project, Durban, South Africa (*Richard Martin*)

Umthombo continues its work of removing children from the streets of South Africa and providing them with a place of safety. Umthombo uses programmes such as surfing alongside its social working programmes to provide alternatives to street life and a future. Recently they entered the South African Schools Surfing Championship and won 1st prize in the Junior Section which led to an offer of a R10 000 "back to school bursary" for these boys. Congratulations to Tom Hewitt the co-founder who was awarded the MBE for his services to child welfare in South Africa this year. He has been working with street children since 1992 after first meeting them on a trip to Maputo, Mozambique, during the civil war in 1990. Thank you for supporting the work by buying hand-made candles. To date we have raised £110.00. Please remember that Richard recycles remnants of candles so would appreciate any which you have left after Christmas.

University of Life, Fortaleza, Brazil – (*Avril Shipton*)

Providing out of school support for 370 children, a strike by state school teachers has meant that children in the slum areas are particularly vulnerable. The current economic climate has also proved difficult for the University of Life operation, meaning that departing staff have not always been replaced, leaving the rest under greater pressure. On a positive note, 2011 saw the start of a very well attended Saturday Children's Church and also a visit to the UK from Ruth and Marc Marques who are fund raising for an off road vehicle. Vision Peoples in Mission, Nairobi, Kenya – (*Pam Buckingham*)

The work of VPM goes on and is more desperately needed than ever, with many refugees from Somalia arriving across the border and putting more pressure on government resources. The school at Korogocho, as well as giving the children an education up to secondary level, also provides them with one good meal a day and Christ Church's contribution to this is very much appreciated.

Some people have sponsored children at the school. For £10 a month a sponsor can provide for the child's board and lodging. In return they get regular letters and updates on the child's progress.
